Recently, in response to a question about what is most important to her about Hope, Shelly Martin, a young leader in the Hope community, said that what's most important is that Hope is sustainable. She could have said that the teen and young adult leadership training that she had been part of is the most important, or the people she has met at Hope, or the beautiful buildings where there had been devastation. She said that while all of those things are important to her, the *most* important is that Hope is not a fleeting promise. She can count on Hope being there. To emphasize the value of this sustainability, she told stories about promises in communities where she has livedprograms and plans for change and youth

projects-that did disappear way too often.

As Hope Community faces the challenges of the recession, we become even more focused on sustaining our mission. This seems like the right time to remember the story of Hope's investment. Hope Community exists today because we saw opportunity where others had given up. Fifteen years ago abandoned land and buildings spoke of a community destroyed. This was a place to leave, not a place for investment, we were told. But we understood that the people left in the community needed a safe and healthy neighborhood to raise healthy families. We saw devastation as creating space for possibility. The community began to develop a vision and take steps to make it happen.

Now on that abandoned land there are inviting and useful buildings that anchor the neighborhood for the future. But buildings alone do not make community. People must build a community, and through Hope hundreds of youth and adults have invested in this community in 2008. In this annual report you will see the evidence of where the community's vision and determination, and many, many partners and supporters, have taken our work. The report is shorter than recent reports as we economize, but the whole story is readily available on our website: www.hope-community.org.

We see and appreciate the challenges our supporters face, and we know you will do what you can. These hard times are even harder for the people in this neighborhood. Together we will weather the storm of the present and continue to achieve the vision for the future. It is with tremendous conviction that we know we can assure Shelley that we will not leave her or this place.




We created more opportunity and have more responsibility. In the following pages, you will see our 2008 accomplishments.





This Was a Place to Leave—Not to Invest In

The year is 1989 and Hope just purchased its first rental home for families and built a playground where a drug house once stood. Since then we have preserved, rehabbed and built affordable rental homes and created outdoor and indoor gathering spaces creating change and opportunity in an area that was deemed hopeless by many. When the only housing people can afford is substandard and unhealthy, families already challenged by poverty are under even more pressure. Hope's affordable, well-designed housing creates possibility in the lives of low and moderate income individuals and families. Now we have

They include renovated 1890's homes, new duplexes and row homes, and large buildings on three corners of the Franklin and Portland intersection and miles south of downtown Minneapolis. In 2008 we completed the third of those large buildings and raised resources for stabilizing older buildings.

The Building that Says It All-The Children's Village Center

At 6:30 a.m. a school bus appears to pick up children waiting outside Children's Village Center, completed in 2003, the first building of the multi-phased Franklin Portland Gateway Project. The building has many purposes that illustrate Hope's work. There are 30 affordable rental homes on the top three floors; a busy community center, and Hope's administrative offices fill the first floor. Just as the last morning school bus pulls away from the building, the community space fills up as adult immigrant students arrive for English, writing and math classes. People stream in and out all day renting apartments, visiting with neighbors and participating in Hope programs. Most evenings and Saturdays kids and parents come to the community center for a variety of purposes. Often residents gather for meetings or sometimes for celebrations of community. This is more than just a building: it is a symbol of hope, community connection and transformation.

It Takes More Than Buildings

When a community has been devastated, rebuilding takes more than buildings. Hope Community's staff works with people in the community to create opportunities. We work with children as young as 6 and their parents. We work with teens and volunteers of all ages. We engage tenants and neighbors who live nearby. We work with people from diverse cultures.

"At Hope Community, I learned how to let other people help me. And I learned that I have a lot to offer to help others."

We teach, we mentor, we build confidence, we use education and the arts as tools for leadership and skill development. We build partnerships to bring more resources. The result is more than the individual parts, as youth and adults build stronger futures for themselves and their communities.

Our Future: Engaging Youth in 13 Different Ways

Right now, Hope has 13 different ways to bring youth through the door to a safe place. With a diverse and experienced staff, committed volunteers and mentors, we find ways to bring youth to strong and positive experiences of community and possibility.

Nearly all the youth are from families experiencing the challenges of isolation and poverty. These years are critical for youth who are on the cusp of major changes and can face negative pressures in the community. We believe in the kids and surround them with a growing community of support and mentorship. We see the impacts: Youth are more comfortable trying new things, they


learn how to learn, they come to appreciate their own strengths and support each other.


